Hearing from Our Home Track!

April 4—Our April meeting featured a visit from Citrus County Speedway (CCS) Owner/ Promoter Mike Reed. As most of you know, CCS is generally considered our "home asphalt track," a mere 26.5 miles from our usual starting point at Laurel Manor Rec Center. In its 57th year of operation, CCS has provided great weekly racing for a wide variety of classes, from an entry-level class ("Hornets") to Super Late Models, at a well-maintained 3/8th mile oval. Our club has made many trips over there in the past six years, and many of you will recall our October, 2007 sponsorship deal with Steve Griffin.



Mike opened his comments with a brief history of CCS, and itemized the ten weekly classes they currently run in their Saturday night shows. He welcomed our group's support of the track, and stressed one of CCS's more attractive attributes...the need to honor Citrus County's 11:00 pm sporting event curfew. "At 11:00, we're done racing no matter what," he jokingly noted. "and you're on your way home!" (Based on some of our past experiences at other tracks, it's clear that we welcome this rule.)

A significant portion of Mike's discussion dealt with the state of short track racing in Florida and it's current trend of decline. At all tracks, he noted, car counts and fan attendance are both down, although CCS has exceeded the average car counts for all Late Model races so far this year. The key, he stressed, is to recognize that tracks are in the entertainment business, and that taking care of the fans is the most critical aspect of managing successfully. Of nearly equal importance, Mike observed, is the need to help the drivers manage their costs. The combina-

tion of these two driving forces has been the focus of CCS, and the results have been positive compared to competing facilities in Central Florida.

Mike closed with an invitation to visit CCS, including the three FUPS series races to be held in 2012.

Update on "Our Car" (New Dixie Racing No. 92)

April 10—One thing's for certain...the world of motorsports is a world of constant change! Add to that the unpredictability that makes racing sometimes seem like an "anything goes" sport, and you have a recipe for the never-ending variety that we've all come to expect. So, with that being said, it probably won't be much of a surprise to you that "our car" is no longer our car!

Dick Anderson reports that ownership of the No. 92 New Dixie Racing Super Late Model has been sold to Duke Racing, Cooper City, Florida (Miami area). The car will be driven by 18 year old TJ Duke (pictured at right), a veteran World Karting Association, Advance Auto Parts Fast Truck Series, Florida Pro Trucks, NASCAR Nationwide, and NASCAR Camping World Truck Series competitor. Dick describes Duke as "the real deal," and is optimistic that the car will continue to be a regular fixture in winner's circles around the state.

A group of us had an opportunity to watch TJ in action April 14 at Citrus County Speedway, and we were not disappointed! Starting on the pole in the feature, TJ led flagto-flag over a line-up of CCS standouts, including Herb Neumann Jr., Scott Grossenbacher, and Randy Anderson, giving the field a good, long look at our club logo on the rear of the car. With Wayne Anderson calling the shots as TJ's crew chief, it was an all-Anderson show as TJ and Randy ran 1-2 for 34 of the 35 laps, with Randy losing the runner-up spot to Grossenbacher at the line at

the finish. Grossenbacher and Randy collided coming to the flag, with Grossenbacher's number 09 going airborne to cross inches ahead of Randy, who made a great save narrowly missing the first turn wall.

But has Dick Anderson retired from racing, you ask? Definitely not! He's busily re-building a car he received in trade as part of the No. 92 deal, with a goal of returning to the track by mid-year. In fact, he's hinted repeatedly that he may get behind the wheel himself to help establish his "new" car's pedigree. Many of you may recall his most recent stint behind the wheel, when in 2010 he donned the fire suit and competed six times, winning four. We'll keep you posted on his progress as the season unfolds.

2012 Prediction Row Segment 1 Heating Up

March 26- The action continues hot and heavy through the first eight races of the season, with our panel of six experts in segment one systematically displaying their forecasting prowess. So far the group has recorded four winning predictions out of a possible 48, for a winning percentage of 8.33%. In addition to that, they've achieved podium (top 3) finishing predictions 27% of the time (13 out of the 48). Top fives and top tens continue to be respectable at 35% and 54%, respectively.

Overall, the group maintains a solid average finishing position score of 11.56 (meaning that, on average, their picks finished better than 12th out of the 43 starters). For starting positions, they fared similarly...their average starting position was outside row six.

While the group's overall performance has been quite commendable, the standout prognosticator continues to be Jerry Conkle, who currently sits at the top of the leader board with a score of 301. Runner-up honors

go to Gary Civiletti, who's coming on fast in the later stages, cutting 17 points off of Conkle's lead in the past two races. The third and final transfer spot is being hotly contested by Fred Coenen and Jim Carter (only seven points separate them after eight races), while Bob Giles and Wendy Touchette continue to duke it out for the cellar.

Segment one ends with the June 3 race at Dover, at which point the top three will take a 13 -race break while the second group competes. Stay tuned!

Bodine Family Honored at Watkins Glen

April 5-Watkins Glen International did it the right way...they asked the fans. After re-constructing five new grandstands at International Speedway Corporation's 60+ year old racing facility at the tip of Lake Seneca in New York's Finger Lakes Region, the track's management turned to its fan base to offer suggestions for naming the stands. Hundreds of suggestions poured into the track, indicating that there is indeed a high degree of race-fan affinity for the venerable facility. While the selected names were reflective of various aspects of the track's history, what is most meaningful to our group here in The Villages is that the Bodine family has received the honor of having their name affixed to what was formerly known as the Green Grandstand. Their selection recognizes the regional accomplishments of the three racing Bodine Brothers, who to-date have competed in 40 events there, driving a combined total of 3801 laps on the road course. Geoff Bodine, a soon-to-be-member of our club's Hall of Fame, logged his 18th and final (again, to-date) Cup win in the 1996 Bud at The

Glen, while younger brother Todd launched his NASCAR Sprint Cup career in the 1992 Bud at The Glen. Middle brother Brett, now NASCAR's regular pace car driver, also competed many times at the Glen during his 18-year NASCAR career. (By the way, Wendy, Tony Stewart has the most NASCAR wins at The Glen [5], as well as the best finishing average [7.1]...at least through the 2011 season.)


May Meeting Preview
